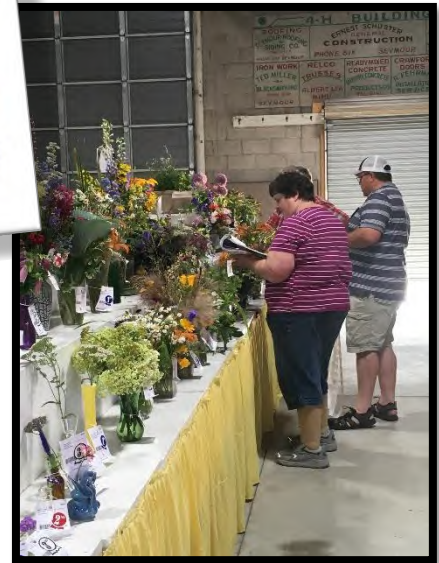

### Animal Fees

Animal Fees are REQUIRED for all Junior Fair animal exhibits housed during the Fair.

- Fees will be paid online at the time of entry or a check can be mailed to the fair office.
- Fees will be due to the Outagamie County Fair by June 15.
- Exhibitors with unpaid fees will NOT be allowed to exhibit their animals.
- NO refunds will be given for animal exhibits entered, but not brought to the fair.

## Outagamie County Fair Association Open Class General Rules and Regulations



### Fair Board Statements:

1. The Outagamie County Fair is operated by the Board of Directors of the Outagamie County Fair Association, a tax-exempt 501(c)3 organization.
2. The Fair Board reserves the right to amend or add to these rules at any time.
3. Outagamie County Fair Association is not responsible for any changes made to this book after publication. Please check the online version of the fair premium book for any updates.
4. Preparing and presenting food for consumption is not allowed in the barns per Outagamie County Health Department.

### Eligibility Requirements:

5. Wisconsin Agriculture, Trade & Consumer Protection Chapter ATPC 160 governs county fairs.
6. Open class is open to all residents of Outagamie County and the surrounding area.
7. Youth who wish to exhibit animals in Open Class must have completed 3<sup>rd</sup> grade.

### Entry Information:

8. Open Class entry begins on April 15. Online entry can be found at [www.OutagamieCountyFair.com](http://www.OutagamieCountyFair.com).
9. Open Class online entry deadline is **May 25** at 11:59 p.m.
10. **NO LATE ENTRIES!!** No changes or additions to entries will be allowed after the deadline.
11. Open Class exhibitors will pay an **entry fee of \$8 (1-5 entries) or \$10 (6 or more entries)**.
12. Season passes (for admittance into fair throughout the week) are available for purchase by Open Class exhibitors. Please contact the Fair Office for more information.
13. Entry tags will be available after June 3. Please call to arrange a pick-up time. (920-833-2941)
14. Entry tags and fair passes will be mailed out upon request and receipt of a \$5 mailing fee. The Outagamie County Fair is not responsible for lost or delayed mail.
15. Entry Fee will be paid online at the time of entry to the fair office or a check can be mailed to the fair office.
16. Animal fees (if applicable) will be paid online at the time of entry or a check can be mailed to the fair office.
  - \$5/animal – Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep, & Goats
  - \$2/animal – Poultry & Rabbits
  - \$25/animal – Stalling for horses staying on the grounds
  - No refunds for animals entered, but not shown.
  - Fees due June 15

### Exhibit Information:

17. All non-animal exhibits must be entered between Noon and 6 PM on **TUESDAY**. All exhibits must be in place by the 6 PM check-in deadline. Any exhibit arriving after the deadline will not be judged.
18. The Fair Association reserves the right to reject any entries offered, particularly such as require an unreasonable amount of space.
19. No animal or article may be entered in any other name than that of its owner and any person violating this rule will forfeit the premium.
20. Exhibitors are requested to pay particular attention to their articles or animals on exhibition and at the close of the fair take charge of the same.
21. The Outagamie County Fair Association will take every precaution for the safekeeping of all exhibits but will not be held responsible for any damage or accident that may occur.
22. Entries CANNOT be taken from the grounds until Sunday evening at 5:00 p.m. Premiums will be withheld if entries are removed before 5:00 p.m. Buildings will be open until 6:30 p.m. for pickup of entries. Animals will be released at 5:30 pm.

### Animal Exhibitor Information:

23. Animal exhibitors must provide State approved identification for each animal.
24. Premise ID is required on entry information.
25. The Fair Association does not furnish feed, straw, or bedding for animals.
26. All animal exhibitors are required to turn in the Animal Check-In Forms to the Superintendent on Entry Day. Forms can be found at [www.OutagamieCountyFair.com](http://www.OutagamieCountyFair.com).
27. All animal exhibits must abide by Wisconsin County Fair animal health rules.
28. It is recommended that animal exhibitors have liability insurance.
29. Animals which show symptoms of a disease cannot be shown. The superintendent of any department may in his/her discretion require the exhibitor to procure a written confirmation from a licensed veterinarian that the animal is free of any infectious or contagious disease.
30. Exhibitors are responsible to clean up manure from their animals any time the animals are out of the barn.

31. Animals will not be released on Sunday until 5:30 pm. All decorations and supplies stay in the barns until 5:30 pm.
32. If an animal on the grounds is in need of veterinary attention, the exhibitor will be responsible for any costs incurred.

**Open Class Exhibitor Code of Conduct:**

33. Outagamie County Open Class exhibitors agree to:
  - Follow the general rules and regulations governing entries, exhibits, judging, and payment of premiums as stated in the Fair Premium Book.
  - Follow any rules relating specifically to a department in which they are exhibiting.
  - Exhibit proper conduct according to the following guidelines:
    - ✓ Show respect for the rights of others and be courteous at all times.
    - ✓ Respect the property of others.
    - ✓ Demonstrate sportsmanship in the show ring, judging contests, and meetings.
    - ✓ Be honest and not take unfair advantage of others.
    - ✓ Refrain from loud, boisterous talk; foul language; and/or horseplay.
    - ✓ No consumption of any alcoholic beverages, if under the age of 21.
    - ✓ Possession and/or use of alcohol is NOT ALLOWED in buildings that house animals or within a 50-foot perimeter around those buildings.
    - ✓ No smoking or vaping in the barns.
    - ✓ Illegal substances are prohibited.
34. No alcohol to be present and/or distributed in the barns.
35. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or show management, other exhibitors, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. All judges, fair and show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
36. The Outagamie County Fair Association reserves the right to interpret rules and regulations and resolve issues. All policy decisions are subject to final approval of the Outagamie County Fair Board.

**Additional Information:**

37. Admission to the grounds will be charged Wednesday from 4 PM until close and daily from 8 AM until close.
38. Transfer or loan of tickets or badges will be considered a fraud upon the Association and be subject to cancellation for the offense.
39. Only animals entered as exhibits or for fair sponsored exhibitions are allowed on the grounds.
40. The Outagamie County Fair Association has the right to publish and copyright any exhibitor's image (including audio, moving image or photography) for educational programs, websites, and promotion of its programs. Any exhibitor not wanting to be photographed needs to submit a letter to the Fair office by April 1.
41. Those participating in the Outagamie County Fair Open Class may request reasonable accommodations for disabilities by contacting the Outagamie County Fair Office by May 25. The participant will be contacted as soon as possible to discuss the request for accommodation and the appropriate county fair officials will be notified of accommodations that have been approved.

**Rules Violation Information**

42. The Outagamie County Fair Board reserves the right to interpret rulings should questions arise.
43. Exhibitors violating any of the above rules and/or department rules will be subject to any or all of the following consequences:
  - Notification of emergency personnel if there is reason to believe that it is necessary.
  - Individual may be required to appear before the Outagamie County Fair Board to explain his/her actions.
  - Removal of individual and his/her exhibits from the present year's fair. Any premiums earned will be revoked.
  - Revocation of privilege to enter exhibits in future Outagamie County Fairs.
44. Any deliberate manipulation of rules or entries to gain an unfair advantage shall result in forfeiture of ALL premiums and awards as well as possible disbarment for up to three (3) years from the Outagamie County Fair.

## IAFE

### International Association of Fairs & Expositions National Code of Show Ring Ethics



Exhibitors of animals at livestock show shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education.

This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics", fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial, and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards, and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demeaning the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.  
If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence

of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show.

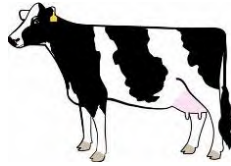
At any time after an animal arrives on the fair of livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counter-irritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions including *Fairs and Expositions* and any special notices to members.
11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

## Department 1 Dairy Cattle

Judged Friday at 9 am



### Entry Info:

- All animals in this department must be registered.
- An exhibitor shall be allowed to exhibit not more than 2 animals under only one class/lot number and not more than **15** cattle from any one exhibitor will be accepted. If facilities become overcrowded, the number of cattle entered per exhibitor will be reduced. This number will be determined by the fair management.
- Refer to ATCP 160.08 for age divisions.
- A registration or Wisconsin approved ear tag number must be included with entry information. Entries will not be accepted without it.
- Youth who have completed 3<sup>rd</sup> grade may exhibit animals in Open Class.
- Animal fee is **\$5/entry**.

### Exhibit info:

- Exhibits must abide by the Wisconsin County Fair animal health rules.
- The Outagamie County Animal ID form must be turned in on entry day to the superintendent. Farm Premise ID number **MUST** be included on the form. This information is required by the state. Form can be found on the fair's website. [www.OutagamieCountyFair.com](http://www.OutagamieCountyFair.com)
- In the event that exhibitors do not keep the animals and facilities in a sanitary attractive manner, the fair association may penalize exhibitors and the penalty may be deducted from the premium won by the exhibitor. All animals are to be cleaned up in a respectable manner in order to be entered in this department. Aisles and entrances must be clear of equipment and feed supplies.

**Cow, 2-year old** – DOB is between Sept. 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and Aug. 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year – includes a yearling that has freshened

**Cow, 3-year old** – DOB is between Sept. 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and Aug. 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year

**Cow, 4-year old** – DOB is between Sept. 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and Aug. 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year

## Department 2

#### Entry Info:

- An exhibitor shall be allowed to exhibit not more than 2 animals under one class/lot number and not more than 15 cattle from any one exhibitor will be accepted. If facilities become overcrowded, the number of cattle entered per exhibitor shall be reduced. This number will be determined by the fair management.
- Refer to ATCP 160.08 for age divisions.
- A registration or Wisconsin approved ear tag **MUST** be listed on the online entry.
- Managerial animals permitted.
- Youth who have completed 3<sup>rd</sup> grade may exhibit animals in Open Class.
- Animal fee: **\$5/entry**.

- Exhibits must abide by the WI county fair animal health rules.

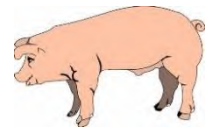

#### Entry Info:

- A market hog will consist of a barrow or gilt. A barrow is a male castrated and healed.
- Entries may include purebred, grade, or crossbreed hogs
- No more than 2 entries per exhibitor.
- A registration or Wisconsin approved ear tag number must be included with the entry. Entries will not be accepted without it.
- Youth who have completed 3<sup>rd</sup> grade may exhibit animals in Open Class.
- Animal fee **\$5/entry**.

- Farm Premise ID **MUST** be included on Animal Check-In Form due to Superintendent on entry day.
- Any fowl showing any symptoms of a contagious or infectious disease cannot be exhibited. If any exhibitor's string of fowl shows general symptoms of any specific disease, the entire exhibit will be ordered removed.
- Feed and water containers must be furnished by the exhibitor. Feed and water containers must be non-breakable. Fowl must be fed and watered daily.
- All exhibitors must be present, or provide a substitute, for judging, including birds that are judged in their cages. Birds will not be presented to the judge by the superintendent or their assistants in the exhibitor's absence. Exhibitors must present chickens and bantams to the judge's table for group conference judging. All other fowl will be judged in the cage or beside the cage; exhibitors may be asked to remove their birds.
- Judges will award no premium on inferior fowl or birds improperly classified, even though there is no competition. All specimens will be judged by comparison. The judges will use as their guide, "The American Standard of Perfection", except that the weight clause will not be applied. All poultry is characterized and described by class, breed, and variety.
- All poultry exhibits must be claimed between 5 and 6:30 p.m. on Sunday.

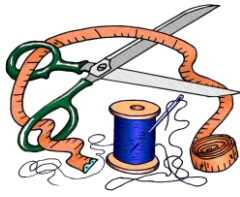

### Agriculture, Trade & Consumer Protection Wisconsin Administrative Code Chapter ATPC 160 County and District Fairs

#### ATPC 160.01 Definitions. As used in this chapter:

- (1) "Breed class" and "breeding class" mean a specific breed within a class such as holstein in the dairy class.
- (2) "Class" means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.
- (2m) "Conference judging" means a judging system using a discussion about each exhibit with the entire group.
- (3) "Danish judging system" means a judging system that allows for multiple first, second, third & fourth class selections as provided in s. ATPC 160.91 (4) (b).
- (4) "Department" as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, "department" means the state of Wisconsin department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection.
- (5) "Division" means one of 3 exhibitor group classifications for a fair and limited to junior division, open division and senior citizens division.
- (6) "Entry class" means a class in which the fair allows exhibitors to submit entries.
- (7) "Exotic domestic animal" means an animal that is not a common farm animal.
- (7e) "Face-to-face judging" means a judging system using a semiprivate discussion between the judge and the exhibitor with the following phases: (a) Get acquainted. (b) Learn the background of the exhibit. (c) Self-evaluation. (d) Evaluator comment. (e) Parting.
- (7m) "Fair" means a county or district fair eligible to receive state aid under s. 93.23 (1) (b) or (c), Stats.
- (7s) "Fair board" means the governing entity of a fair.
- (8) "Lot" or "lot number" means the numerical designation assigned by a fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.

- (9) "Market class" means a class that includes animals of a certain weight for the species that can be sold for slaughter.
- (10) "Premium" means a monetary prize that a fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.
- (11) "Regular judging system" means a judging system that allows for one first, second, third and fourth class selection as provided in s. ATPC 160.91 (4) (c).
- (12) "Self determined project" means a project that meets all of the following criteria: (a) It is approved by the fair board. (b) Its subject matter is related to any of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, or 20 to 29. (c) It does not fall into a defined entry class within any department. (d) It is carried out by a member of a youth organization.
- (13) "Youth organization" means an organization under adult leadership that has educational programming.

#### ATPC 160.02 Premium requirements.

- (1) GENERAL. Register September 2022 No. 801, eff. 10-1-22. CR 21 (a) The state aid authorized by s. 93.23 (1), Stats., may be paid on net premiums paid by a fair. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair that does not enforce animal health provisions under ch. ATPC 10 that are applicable to animals exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft. (b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify actions taken by a fair. (c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the organization or for any other reason. (e) No fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class. (f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests.

- (2) PREMIUM LISTS. (a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. ATPC 160.92 (3) (c). (b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request. (c) Sections ATPC 160.01 through for which state aid is requested.

- (3) ENTRY FEES. 160.07 and 160.91 shall be published in premium books used by a fair (a) A fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee or charge stall rents for animals, or both. (b) Exhibitors in department 35 shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.

- (4) SPLIT FAIR DATES. (a) For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year. (b) Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split dates based on hardship. (c) The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates with advance notification to the department: 1. Clothing revue. 2. Demonstrations. 3. Favorite foods revue. 4. Dogs. 4m. Cats. 5. Small animals. 6. Rocketry. 7. Shooting sports. 7m. Mechanical projects. 8. Other exhibits and contests that are similar to those identified in subds. 1. to 7. (d) If there are split dates under par. (b) or (c), all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio-visual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat a demonstration or exhibit.

- ATPC 160.03 Exhibition requirements. A fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

(1) No fair society or other organization sponsoring a fair may require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor may the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society, or require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the society.

(2) State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.

(3) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. ATCP 160.02 (4). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. ATCP 160.49 (7).

(4) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fairgrounds before 4 p.m. on the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animal on the ground. History: Cr. **ATCP 160.05 Open division; general requirements.**

(1) The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into multiple premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for the last place in the class.

(2) All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. ATCP 160.09.

(3) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.

(4) State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item or animal that has been exhibited in open class division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item or animal.

(5) The fair board may establish specific classes by professional and amateur level groupings within classes for open class departments 14 to 28.

**ATCP 160.07 Classes; general requirements.**

(1) Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.

(2) (a) Except as provided under par. (b), no fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered. Registered status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration. (b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.

(3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.

(4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.

(5) The age of an animal, for purposes of determining its entry class under this chapter, shall be determined as of the opening day of the fair.

**ATCP 160.39 Senior citizens division; general requirements.**

(1) The age of exhibitors in the senior citizens division is limited to persons 62 years of age or over.

(2) Exhibitors in the senior citizens division may not enter identical items or articles in both the senior citizens division and the corresponding classes of the regular open division.

(3) State aid may not be used to award more than one premium to an exhibitor in a premium or lot number in the senior citizens division.

(4) State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item that has been exhibited in the senior citizens division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item.

**ATCP 160.49 Junior fair division; general.**

(1) In the junior fair division, the department may pay state aid on prizes offered to exhibitors who are ages 8 to 20 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year and exhibitors who are 5 to 9 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year who are exhibiting under s. ATCP 160.65. A fair board may establish specific entry classes within each department. A fair board may establish subgroups within a junior fair entry class based on the exhibitor's age or grade in school. The department may not pay state aid on prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or a project which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair.

(2) All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be members of a youth organization approved by the fair board.

(3) Exhibits in the junior fair shall be the product of the exhibitor's own labor. An exhibit may include a study project, merit project or other special project, a skill area, or a supervised occupational experience in which the exhibitor is regularly enrolled, provided that the fair board approves the project, skill area, or supervised occupational experience as an exhibit.

(4) State aid may not be used to award more than one premium to an exhibitor in a premium or lot number in the junior fair division, except for any of the following: (a) A premium may be awarded to each member of a group that collectively owns and enters a livestock exhibit in departments one to 5 of subch. IV. (b) An exhibitor may receive a separate premium for showmanship where authorized under subch. IV. (c) An exhibitor may receive more than one premium in a department for which additional premiums are specifically authorized under subch. IV.

(5) State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item or animal that has been exhibited in the junior division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item or animal.

**ATCP 160.91 Judging regulations.**

(1) Judging shall be done at fairs by individuals who are registered with the department. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department. (1m) (a) An individual shall register by submitting to the department an application. The department shall register all individuals who qualify to be judges, including having the knowledge, training, or experience in the specific classes to be judged and adhering to ethical judging practices. The registration is valid for five years. (b) An individual submitting an application after July 1 may not judge for the current fair year. (c) A fair representative may request the department waive par. (b) in cases of unanticipated emergency situations.

(2) Each judge at a fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.

(3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.

(4) (a) Danish system judging may be used in the junior fair division. State aid may not be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any other division. (b) When classes in the junior fair division are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups. (c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all

exhibitors. (4) ( b ) and (4g) When classes in the junior fair division are judged using the conference judging system, the judge shall use sub. (c) to award placements in a class.

(5) If any class of exhibits at a fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class.

(6) Special educational exhibits may be established if the proposal is presented to the department before October 1 of the year preceding its proposed establishment and the exhibit is approved by the department.

(7) Within any junior fair department, a fair may establish special classes where none are specified under this subchapter. Special classes may include classes for grade and crossbred females in the beef, swine, sheep and horse departments. Premiums for special classes created under this subsection shall be equal to premiums for comparable classes established in the same department under this subchapter.

(8) The fair board may establish specific classes are age or grade level groupings within classes for each of the junior fair departments 14 to 16, 18, 20 to 29, 31, 33, and 34.

(9) Judging in the junior fair division may be done using the regular, face-to-face, conference or Danish judging system.
